**PRELIMINARY PUBLIC COMMENT ON AGENDA ITEMS ONLY**

Sue Wilder of 11 Granville Court, Marlton, New Jersey thanked Mayor and Council for their support in speaking out in opposition of the anti-semitic remarks of Rosemary Bernardi of the Evesham Township School Board. Ms. Wilder stated that she does need to resign.

Carol Birns of 395 Holly Road, Marlton, New Jersey stated she was upset about Mayor Brown's response to her email requesting that the Mayor remove his press release from the Township website. Mayor Brown stood behind his decision to add this press release to the Township website.

David Thompson of 353 Holly Road, Marlton, New Jersey addressed Council and expressed his discontent with the Mayor's remarks on a meeting that he did not attend. He also stated that he attended the school board meeting and that the comments and remarks alluded to in the Philadelphia Inquirer did not happen. In addition, Mr. Thompson feels that it is an unnecessary expense for the School Board or Council to be wasting tax dollars on any type of legal action.

Kevin Stone of 11 Crofton Chase Court, a member of the Evesham Township School Board, approached Council and stated that the comments are not alleged but fact. He stated that Mrs. Bernardi made these anti-semitic comments and requested that she resign.

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Joe Barbagiovanni of 21 Florence Avenue, Marlton, New Jersey stated that this issue has nothing to do with town council and should be handled by the school board. He also stated that people frequently say things or make jokes they should not, including the Mayor's comments toward Solicitor Gillespie earlier tonight. Mr. Barbagiovanni felt that most people have already accepted Mrs. Bernardi's apology.

Dominick Marandola of 25 Clancy Court, Marlton, New Jersey stated that he is happy that the Town Council has gotten involved in this issue.

Dave Silver of 20 Heather Drive, Marlton, New Jersey stated there was a difference between the comment the Mayor made about Solicitor Gillespie and Mrs. Bernardi's comment. He also commented that just because someone didn't hear the statement, it does not mean it wasn't said.

Suzanne Epstein of 24 Lexington Circle, Marlton, New Jersey thanked Council for addressing this issue. Ms. Epstein said that tolerance is taught to children in school and she is happy that Council has stepped forward and asked for Mrs. Bernardi's resignation.

Albert Lutner of 1 Tulip Court, Marlton, New Jersey approached Council and stated that he wished he didn't have to make the following comments. He read off a time table of Mrs. Bernardi's actions over the past few months. Mr. Lutner said that it is time that public officials are held to account for their actions and that Council's request for Mrs. Bernardi's resignation is the proper and correct choice.

Ken Mills of 119 Meadow Lane, Marlton, New Jersey said that he does not feel it is necessary to pick someone out in the community and condemn them. He questioned the legality of the resolution proposed by Council and suggested instead that the issue be referred to an ethics board.

Mayor Brown closed Preliminary Public Comment on Agenda Items Only.

Mayor Brown read aloud some email messages he received and also announced that the New Jersey General Assembly has just released a statement requesting that Rosemary Bernardi should resign immediately.

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Solicitor Gillespie addressed Mr. Mills' concern about the legality of the resolution and stated he feels this resolution is non-accusational and he is satisfied that it is not at risk for litigation.

**Council Comments**

Councilman D'Andrea commented that public officials are held to a higher standard and what they do affects all the residents of the township. Tolerance is taught on a regular basis in the schools and Mrs. Bernardi's comments have impacted all residents.

Councilman DiEnna stated that he has agonized over the thought that some residents of the township don't understand why he has taken this stand over Mrs. Bernardi's anti-semitic comments. He read a prepared statement reiterating the sentiment that these comments were unacceptable and he is not tolerant of her words or actions. Councilman DiEnna stated that those with jurisdiction should take action and appealed to Rosemary Bernardi to resign from both boards on which she serves.

Councilman Zeuli expressed to those in attendance that he does agree with some residents' concerns that Council should not become involved in School Board activities, however, he was in attendance at that meeting and in his opinion it wasn't the words Mrs. Bernardi used but the tone in which she conveyed those words. As a community it is important to show that we do not have tolerance for the inappropriate language of public officials.

Deputy Mayor Hackman commented that as a public official you must be very conscience of what words you use and should not speak carelessly. She further stated that tolerance and anti-bullying is taught to our children and should be practiced.

Mayor Brown thanked Council for contributing their comments. He addressed those in attendance and stated that if Rosemary Bernardi resigns there is no need for legal action. He went on to say that when Mrs. Bernardi apologized she acknowledged that she made these comments. Mayor Brown stated that elected officials must attain the highest professionalism and her resignation would be the appropriate thing to do.

### WORK SESSION

#### 1. Introduction of 2013 Municipal Budget

Mayor Brown updated the public on the status of the proposed tax appeal restructuring bill before the State Legislature and stated that he is hopeful this bill will eventually reach the floor. Mayor Brown also stated that the Township needs to introduce the Budget in order to meet financial obligations and suggested that Deputy Manager of Finance Shanahan anticipate Introduction of the Budget at the June 25<sup>th</sup> meeting.

#### 2. Yearly Review of Health Insurance

Township Manager Cromie introduced representatives from AJM Health Insurance Company and Insurance Administrator of America who have prepared a yearly review of the township's current health insurance plan.

Tony Mahon, President of Anderson Jackson Metts informed Council that AJM has been successful at implementing additional optional health insurance plans to township employees that have resulted in a cost savings to the Township.

Greg D'Orazio, Employee Benefits Specialist with Andrew Jackson Metts stated that since the implementation of the private health insurance plan the township has seen enhanced programs for employees and lower costs compared to the State Health Benefits premiums.

Paul Kelly, President of Insurance Administrator of America stated that through the privatization of the township's health insurance, the health administrators have been able to identify trends which have resulted in some changes that have reduced costs and additionally offered employees more options including a health coach, new plans and teledoc 24 hour service.

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Deputy Manager of Finance Shanahan stated that he is pleased with the health care cost for 2013. He also stated that it is a best practice to always look for other options and monitor costs.

#### **Council Comments**

Councilman Zeuli stated that the township is very fortunate to have a great team that is always actively seeking ways to reduce costs.

Deputy Mayor Hackman commented that it is great that we are saving money and keeping employees healthy at the same time.

Councilman D'Andrea stated that he is impressed with the pro activeness and also stated that this policy could very well help to set standards for other towns.

Mayor Brown inquired how the insurance carrier was able to further reduce prescription costs. Mr. Kelly responded that prescription costs were reduced for the township by changing vendors with no change in cost to the employees.

Mayor Brown also inquired if there would be an increase in state benefit insurance. Deputy Mayor Shanahan responded that the increase could be as high as 20 percent.

Mayor Browns called for a recess at 8:34p.m. Council reconvened at 8:47p.m.

#### 3. Indian Spring Country Club - Report and Projections

Township Manager Cromie addressed Council and stated that since the Township has acquired managerial control of the Indian Spring Country Club on January 1<sup>st</sup> operations have been going very well and the staff is here tonight to give Council an update.

John Lindros, General Manager of Indian Spring Country Club updated Council on the finances related to the golf course. He stated that the first quarter was not very profitable due to bad weather, however the outlook is positive and revenues are up in the pro shop. He encouraged a rate increase stating he believes they can support a higher price line.

Jeremy Hreben, Superintendent of Indian Spring Country Club updated Council on current projects. He said they have been successful at reducing the geese population and the cart path restoration is currently underway. Looking into the future, Mr.

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Hreben would like to see a Master Plan for course enhancement projects.

Frank Hesson, Director of Golf Instruction, updated Council on the golf activities. He stated that 25-30 children have signed up for the summer camp and the National Program for Get Golf Ready will be underway soon. Mr. Hesson said these programs are a great way to promote extra revenue for the golf course, pro shop, and the restaurant.

Cindy Lowden of Marco's Catering informed Council that the catering operation has received positive feedback on their events. They have extended invitations to the public to try out the restaurant and everything seems to be going well.

Township Manager Cromie stated that security cameras will be installed next week at Indian Spring Country Club.

Mayor Brown called for a motion to move Ordinance No. 18-6-2013 up on the Agenda.

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would enable jewelers to cross reference with other municipalities.
